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

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MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Fire Museum of Maryland is to collect, preserve, display, and interpret historically significant apparatus and related artifacts, memorabilia, and records of the fire service in the United States; and to educate the public about the history, people, equipment and techniques of the fire service and about fire prevention and safety.

Imagine passing a fire house in 1871 and looking in the front door! Firemen and horses lived and worked together: the firemen got to go home one day per week; the horses got better care.

Watch as this fire house exhibit grows over the next three years. Structural Preservation Systems has already cleaned and primed the pieces of Baltimore's only remaining cast iron fire house.

A modern steel structure to hold the cast iron was installed by Whiting-Turner. 100 year old flooring, Belgian blocks, a ceiling & a brass pole are part of the funding plans.

The 1885 Amoskeag steamer was donated by William Willock.

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EDUCATIONAL RUMINATIONS

Hi, everyone. I just started September 8th as the Assistant

Director and will be taking on many

of the daily operations of the museum, as well as the Education Department. That way Steve can concentrate on fundraising and the collection.

When I came in to interview with Steve, I was amazed at all the changes that have taken place at the Fire Museum since I was here in 2001. The new configuration of exhibits on the floor greatly improves the flow for tours and appears to open the space up for events. The new 1870s Fire House exhibit looks to be a great addition and when the iron façade is finished, it will be instrumental in explaining how firemen lived. I am also impressed with the complexity and the history of the Fire Alarm Office and the size of the Discovery Room. In addition, the number of objects that can be operated by a docent or are in motion during children's tours greatly enhances the children's ability to learn about fire technology and history.

That said, there is a need to find ways to animate later times periods of fire apparatus, which we will be looking to include in planning exhibits and in future revisions of the tours.

There is also a need to find new ways to advertise our services. As for the Education Department, docents leading school tours will be mentioning that we offer birthday parties, fire engine rides, and museum rentals, which will target chaperones. Every child on a school tour will receive a ruler bookmark that has fire safety information on one side and an advertisement of the museum's services and contact information on the other. In these difficult financial times, everyone meeting the public is a spokesperson for the museum.
